The "God-Bearer"

The title is an ancient one. Theotokos, meaning "God-bearer," was formally given to Mary, the mother of Jesus, at the Council of Chalcedon in 451. This is the same Council that formulated much of the Christology that the Church continues to confess today in its creeds, including the affirmation that Jesus Christ was (and remains) "fully human and fully divine." To affirm that Jesus is the Word made flesh (John 1:14) is to affirm that Mary was the bearer of God into the world. Jesus is as fully human as every baby ever born, and a baby who enfleshed the fullness of God's grace and truth (John 1:14). In this light, Mary was the bearer of God.

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The "God-Bearer"

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Unlike our Roman Catholic sisters and brothers, Protestants have not been too kind to Mary. Praying to and worshipping Mary makes many of us uncomfortable, for good reasons. The Orthodox (Eastern, Greek, Russian) traditions have taken a more mediating approach with the notion of Theotokos. The image of Mary as "God-bearer," I think, is one that we can all acknowledge, honor, and relate to. It's a rich image from which we can learn how to be open to what God wants to bring into the world through us.

My good friend Cynthia Rigby, Presbyterian minister and professor of theology at Austin Theological Seminary, reminds us that, "Mary did not 'sign up' to be the bearer of God, nor was she consulted about the terms of her commitment. Her partnership with God was accomplished by way of faithfulness, by being true to who she was as one named, known and used by God. In embracing this, Mary did not contribute something to God's work, but was instead caught up and included in what God was about."

The late English composer John Tavener (1944-2013) wrote a beautiful "Hymn to the Mother of God." It's a setting of the ancient Divine Liturgy of St. Basil the Great, from the Orthodox tradition, which gives thanks to Mary, the Theotokos, the "sanctified Temple" of God:

*In You, O Woman full of Grace,
the angelic choirs, and the human race,
all creation rejoices.*

...

*In You, O Woman full of Grace,
all creation rejoices.
all praise be to You.*

Recognizing Mary as God-bearer leads us to ask questions about the character of our relationship to God, of how we are caught up and included in God's work in the world. We will explore some of these themes in our adult education series throughout Advent (see below for details). As we move through Advent and prepare for Christmas, let us ask: how are we called to be bearers of God? What does this look like today? ✝



Celebrating Advent

How to Focus on What's Really Important

Many families set aside a family night each week. Here are some ideas from childrensministry.com with suggestions for activities, service, and fellowship. —Dorothy Boulton

Just Our Family

- Work together on a puzzle. Play Christmas carols in the background.
- Each night, read aloud a few chapters from *A Christmas Carol* by Charles Dickens.
- Have each family member choose a Christmas carol, read one verse, and tell why it has special meaning.
- Make special cards for relatives. Together, write a message on each card.
- Go for a walk together. Look for the brightest star, the largest pine cone, the most interesting house decorations, and so on.
- Help each other memorize a Christmas verse, a passage, or a psalm.

Family Friends

- Invite a family that's different from your own to dinner. It may be a single person, a single-parent family, or a family who has a child with special needs.
- Decorate Christmas cookies with another family. Use a roll of prepared sugar cookie dough or make your own.
- Get together with another family and share one holiday tradition.
- Have supper with friends where everyone contributes to symbolizes togetherness in the family of God. Note the individual parts and how they make up the whole. Include a loaf of bread to "break bread" together. Read Acts 2:42-47.

Family to Family

- Make hot chocolate mix, freezer jam, or a simple fruit bread. Give to neighbors or people in your church. Write a Christmas message on each item.
- Shop together for a gift for a child at the McKim Community Center. Place under the tree in the church sanctuary.
- Join with your church family to sing Christmas carols to homebound members.
- Trade childcare with another family for an evening or Saturday so you can shop, back, clean, decorate, or sleep.

December Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the Congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of November 7, 2018.

- Associate Pastor Dorothy Boulton reported on her four-month sabbatical, completed at the end of September. The theme for her sabbatical was “Finding Balance,” and she engaged in many activities to achieve balance in her life. She found the experience refreshing and rewarding, and is thankful to the congregation and the Session for the sabbatical opportunity.
- The Finance Committee reported that there has been some improvement in the budget deficit, but that recovery is not complete. Appeals will continue to the congregation to bring pledges up to date, and to make special end of year contributions to avoid a year-end deficit.
- The Stewardship campaign of “Grace and Gratitude” culminated on Commitment Sunday, November 18, 2018. The campaign included special activities, speakers in worship, and a mailing to members and friends.
- Our new Christian Education Consultant, Jen James, has planned listening sessions for members with children and youth, to provide a forum for an exchange of ideas.
- The Mission Committee is planning more events in lieu of the annual Mission Fair, to engage more members with mission work. The Center, a ministry of Baltimore Presbytery, held an evening of dialogue to discern how God is

at work in Catonsville and imagine ways to deepen relationships with our neighbors.

- Fellowship Hour following worship on November 11, 2018 was devoted to honoring Patricia Chao, who is “retiring” after chairing the Fellowship Hour Team for many years. Many thanks to Pat for her devotion to this service.
- The Nominating Committee is actively seeking members who are willing and qualified to be officers in the congregation. The Committee is seeking candidates for Ruling Elders, Deacons, Trustees, Child Care Council members, and Nominating Committee at-large members. Our officers will be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in late January or early February, 2019.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Adopt a Turkey for Grace AME Church

The last Sunday in September, Robin Price a member of the Missionary Society of Grace AME Church on Winters Lane in Catonsville, stood before the congregation of Catonsville Presbyterian Church and asked that we take a stand against hunger. For many years this very small church has been providing a turkey and all the fixings for a wholesome holiday dinner to members of the community that otherwise would not be able to afford such a feast. This year their monetary resources were depleted and they came to the disappointing conclusion that they would have to cancel this long standing tradition. Robin called me and asked if I thought Catonsville Presbyterian Church would like to partner with Grace AME Church on this very worthwhile community ministry. I said that I knew we would, just let me run it by Ken and Dorothy, Mission committee, the Deacons, Peace and Justice and the Dismantling Racism committee. The response was a resounding YES!

This is what CPC and their friends accomplished in one short month. We collected just under \$2,500, 30 boxes of stuffing, 60 boxes of mac and cheese, 41 cans of green beans, 42 cans of cranberry sauce, 7 bags of rice and 7 frozen turkeys. And just as importantly, 20 members of CPC volunteered to shop for turkeys and the needed food items, pack boxes, and distribute the food to 163 families on November 17. What an amazing response and accomplishment in such a short time! Your generosity brought the missionaries at Grace AME Church to tears. They have said on numerous occasions, "We could not have done this without Catonsville Presbyterian Church." I know this is just the beginning of a wonderful partnership between these two churches and you all were a part of building this relationship.

Envisioning The New Year

As the year winds down and we make our way through the Christmastide, our thoughts turn to the blessings of the season and hopes and dreams for the coming year. We at Catonsville Presbyterian Church have a unique way to help bring the hopes and dreams of this congregation and the wider community to reality, The Envision Fund.

Since 2015, thanks to a generous bequest by Robert Riley, our congregation has been able to fund projects and initiatives that have created brighter futures for people around the corner and around the world. As we approach the new year, what is the future you envision and how might the Envision Fund help make it a reality?

While the deadline for submissions for the 2019 Envision Fund is March 1, now is the time to start planning your application. Application forms and full details of the evaluation criteria can be found on the CP website. All proposals must fall into one or more of the following categories:

- Development — Identify new or expand current ministry areas
- Mission — Local, national, or international
- Peace and Justice Advocacy
- Capital Improvements — Buildings and grounds

While the Envision Fund receives many applications directly from CPC members, approximately half of applications have come from outside individuals and organizations. All outside applications are required to have

sponsorship from CPC members. In past years there has been some confusion as to exactly what “sponsorship” means and what it entails. As the Envision Fund Board evaluates applications from outside sources we ask our CPC sponsors to fill a number of important roles:

- Sponsors help to establish the credibility of an organization.
- Sponsors provide evidence of an existing CPC relationship with an organization. Ideally that sponsor is active in some way with that organization.
- We look to sponsors to help facilitate communication with the group as needed. Having a “local” contact frequently makes it easier to get questions answered about the organization and its application.
- Sponsors demonstrate support for the project. We expect sponsors to not only be a point of contact for a proposal, but also be a knowledgeable and enthusiastic supporter of that proposal.

Sponsors are important advocates for proposals from outside organizations, help the Envision Board better understand those proposals, and demonstrate a connection to our CPC community. But whether you are helping to sponsor the dream of an outside group, or have a vision of your own, we encourage all members of CPC to think about how the Envision Fund can help create a brighter New Year for our neighbors near and far. But don't wait too long. March 1 is right around the corner!
