On October 6 & 7, we will lift up our work in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Tanzania. The Presbyterian Church in the DRC has its roots in 1891, when the Rev. William H. Sheppard, from the Hampton Institute in Virginia, along with Samuel Lapsley, founded the American Presbyterian Congo Mission at Luebo in the Belgian Congo. The Presbyterian Community in the Congo, the oldest Presbyterian denomination, along with the Presbyterian Community of Kinshasa are the two major Reformed communions in the DRC. Today, Presbyterians are engaged in various ministries of education and health throughout the DRC, especially in the Kasai region.

### Saturday, October 6:


#### CPC in the DRC: Telling Our Story.

The Mission Committee will host a Potluck Dinner at 5:30 p.m., followed by a special program that will share the story of CPC’s presence in the DRC, and provide an overview of the many ways we have been involved in ministry there, for more than twenty-five years. And we will welcome back **Don Padgett**, former PCUSA mission worker in Kananga and CPC member, who inspired our work in the DRC. **Bill Rule**, from the Congo Mission Network and member of Shepherdstown Presbyterian Church, Shepherdstown, West Virginia, will share what’s happening at IMCK-Good Shepherd Hospital in Tshikaji in the Kasai. And **Emily Esworthy**, from IMA World Health, will also join us.

### Sunday, October 7:

**Mission in the DRC.** 9:00 a.m. **Jim Cox**, Chief Operating Officer for IMA World Health, will provide the latest news from their work in Tanzania. A recent Envision Fund grant of \$30,000 to IMA is providing life-saving pediatric cancer treatment through the Muhimbili National Hospital in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. Come and hear about this ministry of mercy and healing. (See page 3 for more details.).

**Let us Worship God!** 10:30 a.m. We’ll welcome Dorothy Boulton back from her sabbatical. The **Peace and Global Witness Offering** will be received and we’ll celebrate our unity in Christ.



A gift to the **Peace & Global Witness Offering** enables the church to promote the peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world: 25% of the total offering supports local ministry; mid councils (presbyteries and synods) retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation; and the remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence—including our own—through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. This year, our local portion will support the PC(USA)’s Office of Public Witness in Washington, DC.

World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world today, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed. Come, let us celebrate our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world.

chapters of Dietrich Bonhoeffer’s *The Cost of  
Discipleship*, written in 1937 for the seminarians  
of the Confessing Church in Nazi Germany; and  
Richard Rohr’s *Jesus’ Plans for a New World: The  
Sermon on the Mount* (1996). ✝

# September Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of 15 members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of September 5, 2018.

- The Finance Committee reported that we have experienced the drop-off of income that is typical of the summer months, while expenses continue. The current result is a deficit of \$33,000 through the August 31, 2018, financial report. Reminders to members to “catch up” with their giving are being made in the Sunday bulletin and the *Messenger*, to remind members to bring their giving to the church up to date following the summer months. Supplemental gifts, over and above our pledges, are particularly invited to avoid an end of year deficit.
- Session voted to donate the \$500 in the Vacation Bible School account due to the cancellation of our Vacation Bible School session this summer. The money was donated to Dickey Memorial Presbyterian Church to assist in transportation of children in their summer camp program.
- Session approved the recommendation of the Personnel Committee to hire Lisa Roca as our new Communications Consultant, effective September 10, 2018.
- A Columbarium Task Force has been formed, with Jeanne Mueller as the chair. The task force will be meeting to investigate possible locations for a columbarium or memorial garden that are consistent with our Landscape Plan. The task force also intends to investigate the experiences of other churches with columbariums on their grounds.
- The Website Task Force reported that site design is well under way with the website design firm, Theory One, and content for the site is being developed and refined. Site visits to CPC by Theory One and a photo shoot are planned in the next couple of months. It is expected that the new CPC website will be launched on the first Sunday in Advent, December 2.
- The Creation Care Team is coordinating with the Old Catonsville Neighborhood Association and the local police to address vandalism and other issues with teenagers in the Woodlands area. Neighborhood residents greatly appreciate the work that has been done to improve the Woodlands and want to work with us to keep the area attractive for use by local families, Hillcrest students, and Child Care Center classes.

There will also be signup sheets at the table for volunteers to help fill the bags at Grace AME Church on November 16 and to distribute the food on November 17.


