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Following Jesus

"When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying: 'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven...'" (Matthew 5:1-3).

So begins the beginning of Jesus' teaching in Matthew's Gospel, the Sermon on the Mount, which stretches over three chapters (Matthew 5, 6, and 7). In his classic theological text, *The Cost of Discipleship*, pastor-theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1909-1945) notes that the opening scene of Matthew 5 is dramatic. "The cross casts its shadow before us," Bonhoeffer writes. "Christ, the disciples, and the people—the

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stage is already set for the passion of Jesus and his Church." There is a tradition from the early Church (implied in the Greek) that says before Jesus begins to preach there is a pause—all is silent for a moment or two. And out of that silence comes the demanding, some would even say impossible, teaching of Jesus of Nazareth. The stage is set for the passion of *Jesus* and the passion of his *Church*. The stage is set for the *suffering* of Jesus and the *suffering* of his Church, which follows when his Church follows in his footsteps.

It's Jesus' teaching of the coming Kingdom of God, which begins in the Sermon on the Mount, that eventually leads to the cross. As a result, there is a direct connection between discipleship—being a following of Jesus—and the cross.

In *The Cost of Discipleship*, Bonhoeffer said,

"When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die." These are extremely challenging words for us to hear. But what do they mean for us? Does discipleship, being a Christian really cost us anything today? We need to remember that Bonhoeffer wrote these words in 1937 to the seminarians at Finkenwalde, a seminary of the Confessing Church in Nazi Germany, a seminary that the Nazis would eventually shut down. The German title of this work is *Nachfolge*, meaning, simply "Following."

As we enter the season of Lent, we will turn to the Sermon on the Mount, and sit at Jesus' feet as his students, his disciples, to learn again what it means to follow him. In this series we'll highlight key passages in the sermon and listen for what they might be saying to us today, as we seek to listen to and serve the Risen Christ.✝

As Winter Turns to Spring

Winter is a great time to take a hint from the plants to relax, celebrate dormancy, and deepen your roots. The Creation Care Team anticipates a glorious return of the wildflower gardens and the meadows. As spring arrives, we will be working on new plantings, transplanting, and over-seeding meadow grasses. We will also be developing a new conservation landscape garden adjacent to the labyrinth area.

We are working with a talented certified arborist, Ian Mack, to continue evaluating the woodland's trees: removing hazardous branches, thinning crowded or unwanted trees, and planning for new native trees.

New Woodpecker Habitat

At the entrance to the woods, you can find one of the towering ash trees, that has succumbed to the blight of ash borers. It is now a woodpecker habitat, created by removing all the limbs and keeping a major portion of the trunk. Be alert! The first person to identify a pileated woodpecker there wins an ice cream dessert of their choice from Opies!

Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria

On March 3, 2019 the Mission Committee will host a special lunch program on "Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria" following worship. David Myers, from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, will be our guest speaker to provide an overview on the impact of Hurricane Maria to the island and recovery efforts to date. David is Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's Senior Advisor for the 2017 Hurricane Recovery, overseeing PCUSA responses in Puerto Rico, Florida and Texas. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is the national office of the Presbyterian Church (USA) responsible for leading our denomination's disaster response and recovery.

The lunch and program is open to all who are interested in learning more about what is happening in Puerto Rico and how we can accompany our Presbyterian brothers and sisters there. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's commitment to long-term recovery means there are volunteers needed in locations that are no longer in the media headlines. Volunteers are providing the lunch which will include chili, both vegetarian and meat varieties, corn bread and salads.

An organizational meeting will follow the general discussion for those interested in participating in a trip to Puerto Rico in October or November 2019. A team of volunteers typically work for a week, offering skilled, and not-so-skilled labor, willing hands, and listening hearts. Concert Series Awarded Grant

The Catonsville Women's Giving Circle has selected our concert series, to Catonsville Concerts at 3, to receive one of their grant awards for the 2018 cycle. The \$1,000 grant was presented in February. Funds from the grant will allow the concert series to add a seventh concert to their season again for the 2019-2020 season.

The Catonsville Women's Giving Circle is a philanthropic organization of local women who have a strong, positive, collective impact on the greater Catonsville area by providing funding to charitable organizations and programs that strengthen our community. The organization's membership dues are the primary source of all funds raised for grants, and this has allowed them to distribute \$130,000 in the past six years to local non-profit organizations much like Catonsville Concerts at 3. In addition to the CWGC grant, the concert series receives a grant from the Maryland State Arts Council and the Baltimore County Commission on Arts and Sciences, and donations from Catonsville Presbyterian members and concert audiences. The Mid-Size Church Opportunity

A few weeks ago, I was talking with a colleague about his church's increase in Sunday morning attendance. He exclaimed, "We just hit a huge benchmark! Our average attendance is now over 100. That means we are no longer considered a small church. We are now a mid-sized church!" Outwardly, I offered congratulations. But inwardly, I thought to myself, "Oh NO! Not the dreaded mid-size church! This will be the beginning of the end for him!"

Ok, maybe that was an extreme reaction, but the truth is, there is a lot of research about the challenges of a mid-sized church, much like Catonsville Presbyterian Church. Mid-size churches tend to want the programming of larger churches, but have the resources (money, staff, volunteers, time and energy) that resemble a smaller church. When these churches over program, this can result in staff and volunteer burnout. But the reality is, when small local churches all over started to grow and boom, thanks to a generation of similar name, they were sold on the idea that if they provided more programming, more and more people would show up. Many of these churches ended up with a healthy size, but more programming than they could sustain as the years marched on and the culture changed.

When a church grows from a small church to a mid-sized church, the instinct of many church folks is to hire more staff, sink money into the programs within the walls, and reinvest internally. But what if churches pushed back on that desire? What if churches invested those resources outside its walls? What if churches committed to supporting the community with these resources of money and people? Could doing less inside the walls of the church actually lead to deeper discipleship and richer spiritual growth? How might the church love God and love neighbor more authentically if we invested outwardly, not just with our money, but with our resources of time, energy, and presence?

I think if we could shift the mindset of mid-sized churches in this way, mid-sized churches would no longer be the dreaded size. Instead, they could be the churches best equipped for fruitful, authentic ministry in the 21st century.

February Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the Congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of February 13, 2019.

■ The Finance Committee reported a strong start to the new year, with a surplus of \$17,950 of income over expenses as of January 31, 2019. It is likely that the surplus resulted from some members paying their entire annual pledge in advance.

■ Catonsville Presbyterian will be participating in the annual Ash Wednesday community worship service on March 6, 2019. The service will be held in the style of Taizé at Hunting Ridge Presbyterian Church. Also participating will be Hope and Dickey Memorial Presbyterian Churches.

■ The Christian Education Committee reported that Catonsville Presbyterian youth will be presenting the play “Godspell” later in the spring, with parts played by our youth and their friends from the community.

■ Session approved the Web Design Team’s request for a Twitter account for the church. Twitter will be a useful tool for making short-notice announcements for meetings, cancellations, etc., and for the pastors to use for tweets on behalf of the church.

■ The Personnel Committee is reviewing the employee manuals of the church and the Child Care Center to be sure that they are consistent in the area of terms of employment. The section of the Child Care Center’s manual on terms of employment must be approved by

Session before it can go into effect.

■ Our Christian Education Consultant, Jen James, attended our meeting to review the report of her assessment with Session. The assessment reviewed the strengths and weaknesses of Catonsville Presbyterian, emphasizing that imagination and creativity must be employed to bring about a new vitality to our Christian education programs. Changes must be of the adaptive rather than the technical type, that is they must embrace a change in values, beliefs, roles, relationships and approaches to work. Solutions may require experiments and new discoveries, and may take a longer time to implement than typical “quick fixes.” We are approaching an exciting time, as we live into a new approach to Christian education.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!

Vacation Bible School

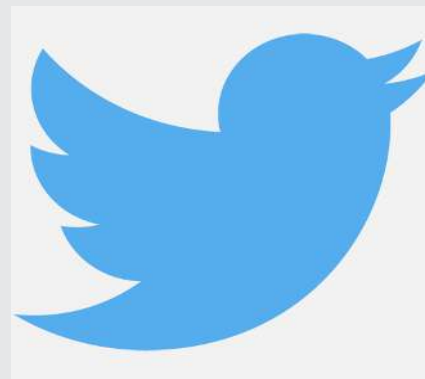

The Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education "Commission," also referred to as the "Kirwan Commission," was created by legislation in 2016. It brings together representatives from across the State to review the findings of the Study of Adequacy of Funding for Education in Maryland, hear from national experts on world-class education systems, and make recommendations for improving education in Maryland through funding, policies, and resources that will prepare Maryland students "to meet the challenges of a changing global economy, to meet the State's workforce needs, to be prepared for postsecondary education and the workforce, and to be successful citizens in the 21st century."

Kirwan Commission Policy Initiatives

- Early Childhood Education – Provide high quality Pre-Kindergarten for all 4 year olds, low income 3 year olds and all children with disabilities
- High Quality and Diverse Teachers and Leaders
- College and Career Readiness Pathways
- More Resources for At-Risk Students
- Governance and Accountability

This Commission and the resulting legislation will determine the formula for school funding across Maryland for the next decade and more! Our schools have not received the funds they require to give our children the education and resources they need and deserve. Now is our chance to ensure that we don't repeat the past – more funding now!
