Follow the Fun

Vocation. Calling. We serve a God who summons us, calls us, shouts out to us: Come. Go. Heal. Be my people. Serve my people. Love my people. Yes, but where? How? We say.

Decades ago, in his helpful book *Wishful Thinking: A Seeker's ABC* (HarperOne, 1993), the Presbyterian minister and writer Frederick Buechner offered what has become a well-known definition of a vocation: "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." This is a pretty good description of what a

call might look like, and it helps one to identify the place where one is called—if one can find the place, that is.

I agree with my friend and colleague MaryAnn McKibben Dana that there's something a bit static about Buechner's take. I've always appreciated Buechner's insights and wisdom. His sermons had an enormous influence on my life as a Christian. In her latest work, *God, Improv, and the Art of Living* (Eerdmans, 2018), MaryAnn offers a critique of Buechner's approach. "I know many people whose work is nowhere near that sweet spot of personal satisfaction and societal need. Their 'true calling' feels beyond their reach. I can see how they would feel like their gladness and the world's need never intersect, but instead run parallel to each other" (173).

Instead, MaryAnn suggests that we follow a different dictum as one that has come to mean a lot to me in recent years. It's from the African-American pastor-theologian-mystic Howard Thurman (1899-1981). He said, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask yourself what makes you come alive and go do that.

Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." This advice might sound self-serving or selfish, but it really isn't. It's an invitation to come alive—and isn't this what God wants for us?

In improv theatre, MaryAnn tells us, there is a guiding principal: "follow the fun." In improv, an actor tracks the energy. "We're on the lookout," she says, "for the scene or character or idea that gives us joy, and then we pursue that to see where it takes us" (174). We can learn much about ministry and being church in this approach. What if we, as in improv, learned to track and trust the energy? What if we learned to track and trust the joy? See where it takes us. See where it leads us. Note the places, moments, experiences when you sense yourself coming more alive. "For where your treasure is," Jesus said, "there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Where are you being called to say "Yes" to what is coming alive in you? Where are we being called to say "Yes!" to what God is bringing to life in us and through us as a church? ✚

Presbyterian Women's Synod Summer Gathering 2019

Overview About the Gathering

The four days of the Summer Gathering were blessed by God. They were enhanced by pleasant weather, great speakers, and the hard work of the twenty-two women who made up the Planning Team. These women worked for a year to bring the details together. Usually, the theme of the Gathering is set by the topic of the National PW Bible Study for the upcoming program year. This year the Bible Study topic was The 10 Commandments. Gideon Amir, a scholar of the Talmud, was invited to help us understand the Jewish interpretation of the commandments. Joyce MacKichen Walker, the author of the Leaders' guide for the study, highlighted certain parts of the study during the Plenary Sessions and in workshops.

Call to Worship

In recognition of our Hebrew heritage and because we were going to be talking about The Ten Commandments there was a Shofar (ram's horn) blown to call everyone to worship. The Shofar was loaned to Gathering Co-Chair Joan Berry by a synagogue in Baltimore.

Then the Opening Ceremony started with the procession of banners from the 13 Presbyteries to the music of "When the Saints Go Marching In," followed by the Lighting of the Christ Candle, and prayer which opened the Gathering.

We hosted a Midrash. A discussion between these two learned people, Gideon and Joyce, followed as they discussed the Jewish and Christian understandings of the Commandments. It was a casual atmosphere as we, the audience, were enlightened and amused by their comments

Workshops Offered

Of the 12 workshops we offered, two of them dealt with issues from the news. One was the ME TOO! Movement that dealt with the problem of the abuse of women. For that, women were encouraged to write, anonymously, on a t-shirt about the abuse they had experienced and then hang the t-shirt on the clothesline to air their hurt, perhaps release their anger, and help it heal. A total of eleven t-shirts hung there before the end and most of them quoted scripture that had helped them rise again after the trauma of their abuse.

The other workshop was about the national tragedy of addiction. There were two workshops about this and the leader was so frank about her history of addiction that almost all those in each workshop came to her privately afterward and admitted that they were an addict, and they had never before told anyone. Think about the healing that can start by those admissions. Just because we are Church Women doesn't mean that we are perfect. We are all flawed and we need to be welcoming of everyone and humble about who we are. God alone is perfect.

We got to know ourselves better, met old and new friends, and left looking forward to the Bible Study and next year's Gathering. We on the Planning Team were thrilled to be used by God to make this all happen. Thank you, God!

Session Meeting Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights of the regular monthly Session meeting of June 5, 2019.

■ The Finance Committee reported that the church has a small surplus of income versus expenses for the year to date, but we must remember that the annual budget predicts a shortfall, so members are urged to keep their pledges up to date throughout the summer.

■ The Session approved a request from the Presbytery of Baltimore to hold its February 13, 2019, gathering at Catonsville Presbyterian. Church members will be asked to volunteer for such functions as welcoming visitors, assisting with parking, food preparation and serving, etc.

■ Representatives of Cub Scouts, sponsored by Catonsville Presbyterian, requested approval to follow national Cub Scout policy and begin admitting girls to the pack. They also requested permission to hold a popcorn fundraiser after worship on several Sundays in September. Session approved both requests.

■ The Nominating Committee presented two nominees to Session for approval: Tom Enokian for Deacon, class of 2021, and Erin Flis for Child Care Council, class of 2021. Session approved both nominations, which will be presented to the congregation for election.

■ The Session had a conversation about reviewing and evaluating the Envision Fund after the first five years of operation of the Fund. The Fund has been a great success, disbursing over \$500,000 to worthwhile causes locally, nationally and internationally. While many aspects of the Fund philosophy and organization were discussed, no decisions were made, and it will be an item on the docket for a future meeting.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easy to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!
