As Office Administrator, Regine welcomes visitors, manages office workflow, schedules the use of the buildings, publishes the weekly worship bulletin. In addition, she maintains the church records and provides administrative support to the church's pastors, staff, and leadership.

The Office Administrator is now a part-time (twenty hours per week) position. The new office hours will be, as of March 1: Tuesday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Over the past couple of years, the Session adjusted the number of hours required for this Office Administrator position. Nearly two years ago, it became a thirty-hour per week position, and we knew that there would be further changes. More time and energy are required to support our digital and online presence (website, Facebook, etc.) and develop and enhance our ability as a congregation to connect digitally as we also host in-person gatherings. In this light, we will soon reevaluate the responsibilities of the Communications Consultant position to align this position with our ministry goals better.

Adult Education Lent in Plain Sight



THE CPC COLUMBARIUM A Meaningful

Alternative for End-of-Life Plans

From the earliest Christian times, there has been a tradition of burying the dead within the confines of church buildings and grounds. The word "columbarium" is derived from the Latin word "columba" meaning dove. The "dovecote," or nesting area, is made up of many niches where doves make their nests. For Christians, the imagery of the dove is a witness to the Holy Spirit, "the Lord and giver of life," who sustains us not only in this life but in life eternal, and is the giver of comfort and peace.

Our Columbarium is intended to meet the needs of those who desire a place of inurnment on the grounds of Catonsville Presbyterian Church. This is in keeping with a Christian tradition of burials in crypts below church sanctuaries, beneath floor stones in the naves, and on adjoining church grounds which would become church cemeteries.

The CPC Columbarium is a ministry of Catonsville Presbyterian Church, to serve the church members and their families by providing a resting place in perpetuity for their cremated remains in a dignified and attractive setting on the church grounds. Urns with the members' cremation ashes will be interred in a sealed niche within the Columbarium structure, with an engraved faceplate on the niche showing their names and birth/death dates.

The Columbarium represents an opportunity to fulfill this essential function in a pleasing, economical and environmentally sound manner. Inurnment in the Columbarium will allow members and their families to maintain a connection to their home church even after earthly life has ended, and memorial services and visitation will be especially convenient compared to using the services of a funeral establishment. Finally, the costs of cremation and columbarium inurnment are a fraction of those with the use of a funeral home and conventional casketed burial. COLUMBARIUM SPRING PAVER ORDER

As you may remember, engraved pavers can be ordered and added to the garden to honor or remember a loved one. You may also purchase a paver to lift up an appropriate text (e.g., Bible verse, poem, or quotation). If you have any questions about whether your text is within the guidelines, please feel free to contact us. Pavers cost \$125 each. The committee plans to put in another order this spring. Deadline for the spring order is March 31, 2022. Costs for shipping are greatly reduced when pavers are ordered in groups of five.

THURSDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY The Letters of John

Join us on Thursday, March 3, at 10:30 a.m. (in person and Zoom) as we begin a new study—the Letters of John (John 1, 2, 3). The Letters of John spoke to the emerging concerns of an early Christian community that cherished John's Gospel. The Letters apply many of the themes of the gospel to new situations. In particular, the Elder, the author, who writes these short epistles, reminds readers that their love of God must be made concrete in the love they show their fellow Christians. At the same time, these texts demonstrate how the church dealt with theological disagreement and division. We have much to learn from them today to help us understand theological diversity and the struggle for church unity. Our guide will be Raymond Brown's, *The Gospel and Epistles of John: A Concise Commentary* (Liturgical Press, 1998). Cost: \$13. And a supplemental text will be C. S. Lewis's classic *The Four Loves*.

STEPHEN MINISTRY Help Needed

We are continuing our search for members of the CPC family who recognize the need and are called to provide Christ centered support to those in our church and community facing difficult challenges such as grief, divorce, illness, unemployment, loneliness, and other life issues. Our pastors are always on the front lines of care. Stephen Ministers support and extend the care that the pastors continue to provide.

Stephen Ministry begins with a solid training program. The training consists of twenty modules and is comparable to an extension course in effective communication. Topics covered include listening skills, distinctively Christian caring, assertiveness, boundaries, and confidentiality. Other modules cover how to care for those in specific situations such as grief or divorce. After training, a Stephen Minister is matched with someone requesting care. They typically meet once a week as long as care is needed. Stephen Ministers meet monthly for support and supervision from the Stephen Leaders and other Stephen Ministers. The care receivers' names and challenges are kept highly confidential, known only to the Stephen Minister providing care and the Pastor or Stephen Leader who matched them. The supervision group is important to identify any issues that arise from the caring relationship and maintain the effectiveness of the program. Stephen Ministers are not professional counselors, and are trained to recognize when and how to recommend a referral.

If you are a compassionate person and good listener, prayerfully consider becoming a Stephen Minister. Contact one of our leaders for more information and/or an application. ILAM HOSPITAL IN NEPAL Life Saving Equipment

Last year the CPC Envision Board provided funding for the purchase of emergency room equipment for Covid-19 patients in Ilam Hospital. IMA World Health has now completed this project, located in the Morang District, a remote mountainous region in Eastern Nepal. This area of Nepal has been hard hit by the virus & didn't have equipment for a separate emergency room.

Funding provided by the Envision Board helped purchase the following items of equipment: 2 Ventilators, 1 Defibrillator, 2 Blood Gas Analyzers, 1 ICU Patient Monitors, 1 Infusion Pump, 2 Suction Machines, and 5 Three Channel Electrocardiogram machines. Working with LWR (Lutheran World Relief), life saving equipment was procured through approved channels & shipped to Ilam Hospital.

After installation, IMA World Health coordinated staff training on the use of the equipment. The newly equipped Emergency Room is being used for Covid-19

patients as well as other critical care treatments in various hospital departments.

Since Ilam Hospital is located in such a remote area, staff turnover occurs more frequently. Government officials have now agreed to provide financial incentives to the medical staff. Government officials thanked IMA World Health for this life saving project. This project has strengthened the hospital's service delivery and its quality of care for all its patients.

In January we received thank you notes for both of these donations.

SESSION MEETING Highlights from February

Your Session continues to meet monthly and is using Zoom to meet online in view of the coronavirus pandemic restrictions. Following are highlights from the Session meeting on February 2, 2022.

- Following the action at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation to dissolve the separate Board of Trustees and absorb the functions and responsibilities of the Trustees into a Building & Grounds Committee of Session, the Session voted to designate former Trustees President Andrew Glennan as Acting Chair of the new Building & Grounds Committee, with Ron Gunderson as Acting Vice Chair, and the former members of the Trustees as Committee members, with all to serve until new officers assume office in May 2022. Ruling Elder Stephanie Stevens will assist in the transition of the Board of Trustees into the Building and Grounds Committee of Session.
- Session will send a representative to the meeting of the Presbytery of Baltimore on February 10, 2022 to vote on concurrence with an overture to the PC(USA) General Assembly from the Presbytery of Giddings-Lovejoy (St. Louis, MO area) entitled, "An Apology to African Americans for the Sin of Slavery and Its Legacy."
- The Finance Committee reported on the financial results for the year to date in 2022, with a surplus of income over expenses of \$20,371, primarily due to the pre-payment of annual pledges by some members.
- The Opening Up Task Force has developed a system to rank to rank the ongoing COVID threat with a red/yellow/green color-coded scale based on the published COVID metrics for the state of MD. The threat level will be determined and published each week on the CPC website and via email to members and friends, to advise the status of in-person vs. virtual worship.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easier than ever to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!
