In worship on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, we heard Matthew's account of Jesus's transfiguration, when Peter, James, and John were overshadowed by a bright cloud and heard a voice saying, "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him" (Mt. 17:5). These words echo what Jesus heard at his baptism—an identity that was tested in the wilderness and throughout his life and ministry. They are words that foreshadow the cross and his resurrection as the beloved Son of God. *Beloved*. This is who Jesus is. And this is what we discover in and through him: that we, too, are the beloved of God.

Highlights From the January Session Meeting

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the Congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights from the Session meeting on February 1, 2023.

The Dismantling Racism Committee requested permission for CPC to host a dinner to celebrate Iftar (Ramadan) with the MARTI organization (Maryland Turkish-American Inhabitants) on March 25, 2023 in Fellowship Hall. MARTI will provide the food and CPC will provide beverages, table settings, etc. Session voted to approve the request.

The Finance Committee reported that for the year to date as of January 31, 2023, the Operating Budget shows a significant surplus of income versus expenses as some members pay their annual pledge all at once, while expenses have not yet been incurred. The Committee also reported that a minor discrepancy in the pastors' benefits was discovered and will require a revision to the pastors' Terms of Call, which have already been approved by the congregation. The Terms of Call will be updated to correct the discrepancy and submitted to the Session at its March meeting, so they can be voted on by the congregation at its called congregational meeting on March 26, 2023.

Session voted to call a congregational meeting on March 26, 2023 following worship for the purpose of electing church officers. The Nominating Committee will provide forms for nominations in upcoming worship bulletins.

Session members discussed the chapter on The Mission of the Church from Carlos Wilton's book, "Principles of Presbyterian Polity."

The Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with the congregation, and we welcome your suggestions for facilitating dialogue. The contact information for Session members is listed in the church directory and on the website, so it is easy to communicate directly with us. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!

March 5: Ukraine Support with Susan Krehbiel

When Russia invaded Ukraine almost a year ago, the Presbyterian Church (USA) wasted no time in reaching out to our international sibling churches and colleagues to see how we could help. Susan Krehbiel—a ruling elder and member at Catonsville Presbyterian—coordinates a cross-ministry response team that provides financial support for this humanitarian assistance. As the Associate for Migration Accompaniment Ministries for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), Susan will share about our national and international partners who are providing assistance to Ukrainians displaced internally and who live as refugees in neighboring countries. She will also share what she saw and learned during a recent visit to Hungary, Czech Republic, Ukraine, and Poland and how this informs her work and ministry. In the years to come—during this war and afterwards—Presbyterian Disaster Assistance will be supporting Ukrainians as they seek safety, wholeness, and when the time comes, a rebuilt homeland.

March 19: Pathos, Empathy, and the Cross with Ken Kovacs

Isaiah spoke of a "suffering servant" (Is. 53) by whose "bruises we are healed." Jesus, talking about himself, said, "the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again" (Mk. 8:31). The suffering that Jesus endured, the early Church believed, brought about something new. The first Christians believed that they could share in Christ's suffering and, therefore, found meaning in their individual and collective experiences of suffering. What do these beliefs mean for us today? Do they still resonate with us and carry the same meaning? How do we relate to Christ's suffering on the cross? Did he have to suffer? And what exactly did he suffer?
