Age of the Spirit

ATE IN HIS LIFE, Swiss Reformed 4theologian Karl Barth (1886-1965) spoke of a coming Age of the Spirit when the church will require a theology of the Holy Spirit to meet the **demands of the times.** I believe we are living in such an age (and have been for a while), and that the turbulent times we're facing as a church with rapid decline might have less to do with the fact that we have lost our way (as some suspect), and more to do with the fact that the Holy Spirit is shaking our foundations, forcing us to get off our butts to move, to go where Christ wants to take us, enticing us to give up old patterns of knowing, old ways of being, and opening us up for something radically new, creative, bold. I'm not talking about a freewheeling movement of the Spirit doing whatever she wants, but the work of the Holy Spirit, which is firmly grounded, connected, and committed to the ongoing power of Christ's resurrection.

The Spirit of the risen Christ is pulsating throughout the universe, a Spirit who is working deep against the defensive structures of the human ego, yearning, struggling, groaning to realize something within us and among us that we could never achieve nor imagine on our own.

And it should not be surprising that the same Spirit—who searches the depths of God's own nature, as Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 2, a God who reveals the depths of love through the power of resurrection—would be at work in the world in ways that are startling, disturbing, conflict-producing, and even chaotic.

Decades ago, at worship in a Catholic church in St.-Germain-en-Laye, outside Paris, on Pentecost, I heard the priest talking about *L'esprit audace*, the audacity of the Spirit. I love that image.

The Holy Spirit is daring, audacious, uncontainable, recklessly bold, intrepidly daring, adventurous. The Holy Spirit is risky, sportive, and playful. Michael Mitton writes,

"The Holy Spirit is not a tame bird, kept in a clean cage, to be released for short bursts of charismatic meetings... The Holy Spirit makes his habitation in some of the wildest, darkest places this world has to offer... The Holy Spirit is wonderfully free, able to go to the dark places of our own lives, for healing to the dark unvisited places of our churches, and to the dark and demon-infested places of our society."

But we need to trust where these experiences are taking us and not pull back in fear.

On June 16 and 17, the Session will have a retreat facilitated by pastor, writer, coach, and consultant, Roy Howard. We will gather to pray and listen and discern and explore what the Holy Spirit is calling us toward as a congregation post-COVID. We will be digging deep into Acts 2:42-47 and Ephesians 4:1-15, asking the questions, "Who is God calling us to be? What is God calling us to do?" We invite you to keep the Session in your prayers during this time.

One of the oldest prayers of the church is *Veni*, *Creator Spiritus*. "Come, Creator Spirit." It's one of my favorite prayers and I say it often. It's a prayer, as one theologian put it, of "open surrender to the absolute creativity of God." When the church trusts in the movement of the Spirit, open to where the Spirit wants to take it, then the church will be free, truly free to be as revolutionary and as radical as we know the gospel to be. The church will be liberated to be as creative and imaginative as the age demands.

The Holy Spirit is continually creating and recreating the world and our lives from within the generative power of God's redeeming love, inspiring us to imagine new ways of being the church. Trusting in the work of the Spirit, the church will be unshackled – infinitely swift – and free to move down whatever road the Spirit wishes to take us!

The Spirit Knows No Borders

What is a mission co-worker? It's not as obvious as you might think.



The Presbyterian Church (USA) sends mission co-workers at the invitation of organizations who seek additional support from the church. The title of "mission co-worker" is embedded with a theological conviction of the Presbyterian Church (USA): true mission partnership is about building relationships, learning from one another and walking together in faith and friendship. Around the world, teachers, church planters, doctors, public health specialists, chaplains and human rights advocates serve alongside Christians in fifty countries. From teaching theology and English to preaching and evangelizing, mission co-workers accompany, listen, work in partnership the global church.

Discuss the Spirit's audacity and adventure

Betsey Moe is one of these mission co-workers, laboring in Guatemala in partnership with the Presbytery of Baltimore. She will be spending time in the Presbytery from June 12-15, and the mission team of Ark and Dove Presbyterian Church has invited our congregation to attend a dessert meet-and-greet on Wednesday, June 14 at 6:00 p.m.

At this meet-and-greet, Betsey will share about the programs and activities of the Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America (also abbreviated in Spanish as CEDEPCA). The non-profit educational organization is headquartered in Guatemala City and provides training in disaster ministry, women's ministry, intercultural ministry, and biblical/theological studies. As a long-time Presbyterian World Mission partner, the center has close ties with congregations and presbyteries across the United States.

Betsey serves as a facilitator for the intercultural training program at CEDEPCA in addition to supporting seminarians, churches, and university students from the United States, planning their educational programs, interpreting for these groups, and leading them in spiritual and missional reflection.

Session Highlights

The Session is a body of fifteen members, elected by the Congregation and ordained as ruling elders, who provide leadership for our congregation. Following are highlights from the Session meeting on May 4, 2023.

In response to a request from Boy Scout Troop 306, the Session voted to prepare a certificate of thanks for Scoutmaster Jeff Scharf in appreciation of his many years of service to scouting and Troop 306. The certificate will be presented to Jeff in worship on May 14, 2023.

The Session approved changing to the summer schedule of 9:30 am worship in the sanctuary on June 4, 2023, and to move to Fellowship Hall for summer worship beginning on June 11, 2023.

The Finance Committee reported that for the year to date as of April 30, 2023, the Operating Budget continues to show a surplus of income versus expenses as some members have paid their annual

pledge all at once, while some expenses have not yet been incurred. A balanced operating budget for the full year is still expected.

Communications and **Operations Manager** Michael Cuppett reported on the communications audit **he prepared**, reviewing our communications and recommendations for maximum effectiveness. Those recommendations include adjusting our focus from informing toward engaging members, using photos of church events and members rather than stock photos, delineating internal versus external communications, and more effectively using social media based on data and demographics.

Tentative committee assignments were distributed to members of the Session, and each person was asked to prayerfully consider their assignments and discuss changes with the moderator. Once finalized, a list of committee chairs will be available on the CPC website.

Before adjournment, members of the Session each drew a name for "prayer partners," for whom they will pray over the next year. Partners will communicate their prayer requests with each other so they may receive support on an ongoing basis.

The Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with the congregation and we welcome your suggestions for feedback. Contact information for Session members is listed in the church directory. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors, or the church office to let us know what your thoughts. We want to hear from you!
